CORE SERVICES



We act as a hub for individuals, journalists, and nonprofits to access local environmental information.

Consultations

In partnership with CPAWS and the Unitarian Church, Manitoba Eco-Network organized a public forum for TomorrowNow, the provincial government's new overarching environmental plan. Over 100 people came to hear Conservation Minister Gord Mackintosh speak about the Province's new environmental plan and to share their vision for a sustainable Manitoba. The forum received coverage from the Winnipeg Free Press, and Free Press reporter Dan Lett moderated.

The Eco-Network also facilitated the formation of working groups to develop collective responses to TomorrowNow and the accompanying legislation, the Green Prosperity Act. Submissions from these working groups and specific Member Groups can be viewed on our website.

Member Forum

We held a forum for our Group and Associate Members on January 30th, 2013. Two journalists from Shaw TV presented practical tips on how to attract media. The afternoon featured a discussion and brainstorm on the services Manitoba Eco-Network provides to its members.

Strategic Planning Retreat

With the help of professional facilitators Denis DePape and board member John Fjeldsted, we established an excellent process for determining our priorities for the next year. At the 2012 board and staff Strategic Planning Retreat, we established four key priorities that require special attention over the next year: Member Services, Fundraising, Advocacy, and the Manitoba Environmental Youth Network. We developed action plans for each and have been making progress as the year moves forward.

Information Services

We continued sending monthly email bulletins to hundreds of individuals and groups, packed with news and resources. We responded to hundreds of information requests via phone, email, Facebook, website, and in person. Manitoba Eco-Network acts as a hub for individuals, journalists, and nonprofits to access local environmental information.

Facebook

Our Facebook page continues to be a cost-effective way to reach large amounts of people. Our 'likes' (people who receive our updates) has grown from 856 to 1061, a 24% increase over the past year.

Website

Coordinator Sean Goertzen redesigned the Eco-Network's main website from the ground up, with the help of Scott Cairns from Computer Service Group. The revamped site features a clean, modern look and uses Joomla for more dynamic content management. The site functions as an important community resource, featuring green job listings, news, events, and information on all of the Eco-Network's programs and activities.

Eco Journal

Published quarterly, the Eco Journal continued coverage of a wide array of environmental topics and gave voice to many conservation groups around the province. To view all issues of the Eco Journal, visit www.mbeconetwork.org/projects/eco-journal


Eco Journal ad revenue has grown from 2 advertisers totalling \$120 for the Spring 2012 issue to 6 advertisers totalling \$732 for the Spring 2013 issue, an increase of 510%. Ad revenue helps us diversify our funding sources and helps the Eco Journal become increasingly self-sustaining.

Reel Green

We are making some major changes to the Reel Green Film Festival. We are changing the name to simply "Reel Green" with the tagline "Inspiring people, celebrating nature." We aim to make Reel Green a positive celebration that reinvigorates environmentalists. For 2014, Reel Green and the Anne Lindsey Protecting Our Earth Awards will take place on February 1st. Both will be included in the 2013-14 Annual Report.

Approximately 39 participants attended the workshop at the Fort Garry Hotel. The participants filled out very positive workshop evaluation forms and we continue to see demand for and appreciation of these kinds of workshops.



NETWORKING & OUTREACH

World Water Day

World Water Day is held annually on March 22 as a means of focusing attention on the importance of freshwater and advocating for the sustainable management of freshwater resources. For World Water Day, the Water Caucus partnered with the Council of Canadians to organize a free film screening and panel discussion at the University of Winnipeg. The event was well attended with over 40 people and provided an excellent opportunity for the Water Caucus to speak and engage with the public.

Networking Events

The Water Caucus attended 13 conferences and meetings throughout the region, which support the goals and objectives of the project and share the information amongst other water professionals. Furthermore, we facilitate referrals amongst the general public, ENGOs, government agencies and the media on water issues.

Water E Bulletin

Our electronic newsletter is sent out bi-monthly to a list of 600 contacts (an increase of 50 subscribers since year eight of the project) interested in water issues in Manitoba. The Water E-Bulletin features events in the region, consultation opportunities, resources, news, and links to new water information. The newsletter is also updated accordingly to our website. A table is staffed at public events, soliciting new contacts that wish to receive the Water E-Bulletin.

A New Water Caucus Website

In September 2012, the Water Caucus developed and launched our own new website – www.mbwatercaucus.org. Previously we had only a webpage on the Manitoba Eco-Network's website. Our new website features our comprehensive publications in electronic format, water news, Water Caucus meetings and workshop proceedings including presentations, Water Caucus updates, an archive of our Water E-Bulletin as well as upcoming events and conferences. Over 600 people visit our new website monthly to learn more about Lake Winnipeg, Wetlands, bottled water, hydraulic fracturing, water news and upcoming events. This is a significant increase to previous years when the Water Caucus did not have its own website. Communities Canada)

Publications

We distributed over 1000 publications on key water topics in Manitoba at 13 different workshops, events, and display opportunities throughout Manitoba. These publications included:

Additionally, the Water Caucus published an article in the Manitoba Eco-Network's Eco Journal about alternative plumbing options for Manitobans called "Beyond the Dual-flush Toilet".

Multi-Stakeholder Workshop

On March 20, 2013 we held a multi-stakeholder workshop at the River Discovery Centre in Brandon titled "Keeping Water on the Land". In addition to providing education for the participants, our workshops bring in new participants to our Water Caucus meetings, create new connections between the public and decision-makers, and increase citizen's ability to participate in water policy and planning processes in their community.



ORGANIC LAWN CARE

In 2012, the Organic Lawn Care program continued to develop into a more resource-based program

In 2012 Amanda Kinden was hired as the Organic Lawn Care Project Manager. Natalie Baird was hired as the Organic Lawn Care Educator under the Province of Manitoba's Green Team program. Manitobans continued to seek the resources and expertise provided by the Organic Lawn Care Program.

Demand for information around organic lawn care and alternatives to chemicals continued to grow.

Resources

An exciting addition to the Organic Lawn Care program included the creation of two videos on Organic Lawn Care and Pesticide Use in Manitoba. The videos can also be viewed at mbeconetwork.org/organic-lawn-care. The Reel Mower Sharpening video, created in 2010 by Ryan Simmons and Y-Eco Intern Amanda Kinden has seen an incredible 100,000 views to date! The Organic Lawn Care program continued to operate the Lawn Library which allows residents to borrow lawn care tools and books on organic lawn care, weeds, and gardening. Pesticide Free lawn signs are available for \$5.00.

Public Outreach


Between May 28th and June 26th, 2012, eight Organic Lawn Care Workshops were hosted in public libraries across Winnipeg. In total 35 people attended the workshops. Over the years there has been a steady decline in library workshop attendance, so this year the program put more focus on workplace Lunch and Learn presentations. Six Organic Lawn Care Lunch and Learn Workshops were held between May 22nd and June 24th, 2012. In total 91 people attended the workshops.

Organic Lawn Care displays were held at various events around Winnipeg. Attendees were invited to take copies of the Organic Lawn Care Manual, as well as handouts on a wide range of organic lawn care related topics. The Organic Lawn Care program also offered Mow Better Clinics intended to teach participants how to sharpen their push (reel) mowers while educating them on the tips and tricks to mowing lawns more effectively. Two Mow Better Clinics were held, one in partnership with Daniel McIntyre St. Matthew's Community Association. The second clinic took place at Norberry-Glenlee Community Centre.

The Organic Lawn Care section of the Manitoba Eco-Network website was updated and now includes four pages. This update allowed for the separation of resources and public outreach information making the Organic Lawn Care site more user-friendly.

Program Guide

In an effort to help make the Organic Lawn Care program run smoothly, Amanda developed an Organic Lawn Care Program Guide. The guide details the tasks that need to be done to get the program up and running. There are links, phone numbers, and guidelines for when to begin specific tasks. Different from the Organic Lawn Care manual, this document provides an outline of everything that happens in the Organic Lawn Care season. This will be very helpful to the Organic Lawn Care educators in 2013.

Highlights

Susan Lindsay and Curt Hull attended week-long training in San Francisco for Al Gore’s Climate Reality Project. We have been invited to become a member of the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce’ Manitoba BOLD initiative’s Clean Energy policy advisory committee.

We are on the Initiating Committee that has established a Transition Towns chapter in Winnipeg.



Mentorship and Environmental Art Mentorship Programs

One of our most popular workshops “engaging in action projects” inspired two new Mentorship programs. Both Mentorship programs aimed to create youth leaders through facilitated, and creative experiential learning, regardless of their experience or skills.

The Environmental Art Mentorship program was facilitated by Natalie Baird and supported by the Manitoba Environmental Youth Network. In this program, a small group of youth developed connections with environmental professionals and artists. The group created pieces of art that reflected environmental issues in Manitoba. The Environmental Art Mentorship also created a series of posters with the slogan “It’s not just romantic, it’s sustainable!”. The posters show a collection of activities from a romantic, simplistic lifestyle that is also sustainable. These posters were designed to be displayed in businesses, schools and organizations across Manitoba. A website was created to showcase the posters <http://environmental-art-mentorship.tumblr.com> and also contains information about sustainable activities and the artists involved in the program.

The Mentorship program brought together youth who have expertise in running a successful environmental project, with a group of youth who are eager and willing to take positive environmental action. The steering committee selected mentors formally trained in areas including environmental education, public speaking, project management, leadership, and fundraising. The mentors met regularly with their youth group to set goals, plan measurable results and finally implement and monitor their joint environmental project. The mentorship projects included wilderness biology, composting, three water conservation initiatives, and an environmental art project. Numerous site visits, planning meetings, and action days helped create tangible results and education for the communities of the participating eco-groups.

Environmental & Capacity-Building Workshops

The education component of the Youth Network is delivered through a series of workshops that are advertised and requested by individual youth, eco-groups, and conference organizers. Workshops included: 12 steps to an action project, fundraising 101, work plans, budgeting, group facilitation, climate justice, composting, active transportation, how to run a conference, and custom workshops.

Conferences

The Youth Network is host to Greenspace, a youth-led two day annual conference. With increasing popularity, Greenspace has been able to educate, inspire, build the capacity of youth and mobilize action for a more sustainable province. In November 2012, Green Space attracted approximately 90 students from Churchill, St. Mary’s, Miles Macdonald, University of Winnipeg, College Beliveau, Sisler, Kelvin, Garden City Collegiate, Dakota, Carmen, and Gimli High School.


Communication

With the help of Brenden Fortescue, MB Eco-Network Digital Intern, the Youth Network’s website www.mbeconetwork.org/youth/ was redesigned in 2012. The Youth Network promotes events, grants, jobs, and volunteer opportunities via our newsletter which reaches over 400 people and our social media site which reaches 1,000+. We encourage youth to work with Manitoba Eco-Network’s 70 member groups on specific issues and ongoing programs. The opportunities presented by the Youth Network encourage youth to develop necessary skills to not only complete community projects but also prepare for future employment.

Going forward the Youth Network aims to increase our capacity as a youth-lead organization that strives to create peer-to-peer connections and mentorship opportunities among Manitoba’s youth working on sustainability initiatives in their communities and schools.

The Manitoba Environmental Youth Network is a unique program that is helping to build a capable, knowledgeable and connected youth community who accomplish inspiring positive environmental action.

This program embraces the ‘youth leading youth’ approach by having a youth steering committee supporting youth led projects and education which in turn unites their efforts and empowers youth.

CHILDREN'S HEALTH & ENVIRONMENT PARTNERSHIP

About CHEP

The Children's Health and Environment Partnership of Manitoba (CHEP) is concerned with helping youth, families, child advocates and health serving organizations to understand and take measures to address the inequitable risks facing expectant mothers, infants and children in our natural and built environments. CHEP's activities and projects build on the work carried out by other groups across North America. We collaborate with these groups to collect, share and improve information about children's environmental health for a local audience. CHEP's agenda and activities are set by the volunteer Coordinating Committee, made up of the partner organizations: Manitoba Eco-Network, Klinik Community Health Centre, Social Planning Council of Winnipeg, Campaign for Pesticide Reduction, Greenplease, and Chemical Sensitivities Manitoba.

Community Outreach

In July 2012, Christine Kolba was hired as CHEP's new Program Coordinator. CHEP makes every effort to act as a bridge between resources and the community. Christine worked with University of Manitoba nursing students, Brittney Chute and Laura Koslowsky to update and deliver the Health Promotion Toolkit Workshop. All workshop attendees learned the ABC's of Children's Environmental Health, then made non-toxic cleaning supplies. Attendees went home with non-toxic cleaners and a collection of easy-to-adopt recipes.

CHEP is dedicated to providing information that caregivers can use to contribute to a healthier environment. In order to make our resources more widely available, we created a new website (www.childrensenvironment.ca), blog, newsletter, and Facebook page. New materials were added to CHEP's ever-expanding library of resources, while past materials were updated. Looking forward, CHEP will continue to work collaboratively with the community and focus on educating caregivers, giving them the knowledge they require to make purchasing decisions which are safer for their children and the environment.
