



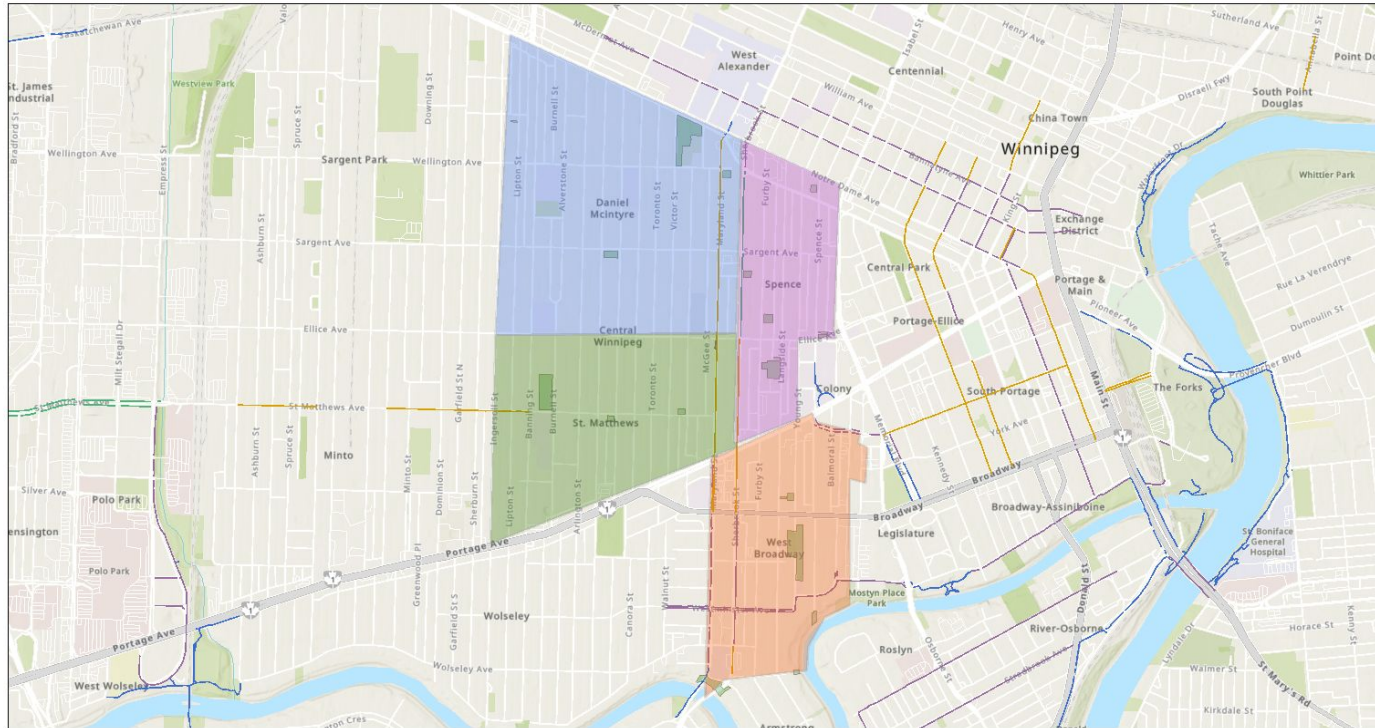
The *'Cold Weather, Hot Weather, and Your Hydro Bills'* survey and accompanying research was conducted in Winnipeg, on Treaty One Territory - the traditional lands of the Anishinaabeg, Ininew (Cree), Anisininew, and Dakota Peoples, and the National Homeland of the Red River Métis, where the drinking water come from Shoal Lake 40 First Nation in Treaty Three Territory and our hydroelectricity is sourced from First Nation communities along the Nelson River in Treaty Five Territory.

We also reflect on the reality that the consumer electronics we take for granted to assist all aspects of our work contain mineral and precious metals that have likely been mined from all over the world. We recognize that the lands that are mined and the people who do that labour may be facing environmental injustice as well. We acknowledge this common thread. Through this work, we envision a brighter, healthier future for the land and its people and an end to environmental injustice everywhere.

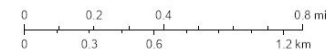
